INTRODUCTION

Are you at the point in life where you're looking for new ideas and adventures? Feeling in a rut, or just wanting to make sure you're enjoying your life to the fullest? You have come to the right place! We live in exciting times. Opportunity for personal growth and lasting adventure surrounds us if we dedicate ourselves to looking out for it. But in our busy, overworked, and distracted world, it can be easy to let those possibilities slip by. Every day I try to keep an open attitude in the hope it will steer me toward taking chances, stretching for goals, and continuing to move forward in life to experience as much as I can, as fully as I can.

Does that sound like a mantra for living that you'd like to embrace? Make it your own from now on with this book. In the pages to come I offer ideas for anyone at any point in his or her life—starting out, midway through a career, or winding down workwise—who wants to add a challenge, perhaps a touch of glamour, and a solid sense of satisfaction, enjoyment, and accomplishment to their pursuit of a well-lived life. This list includes unique travel destinations, a great many personal challenges, and more than a few unusual pastimes, and will amuse and delight readers with a host of new ideas. So let's get started.

THE WELL-LIVED LIFE? DEFINE YOUR TERMS...

You might be wondering, “A well-lived life, according to *whom*?” No one wants to be told what to do, where to go, or how to think, of course. And that's not what this book aims to do. Rather, its goal is to inspire you to pursue exciting new experiences you've always dreamed of (and some you may have never imagined), whether those experiences are halfway across the world or right in your own backyard. Also,

don't use this list as a reason to feel inadequate about what you've done in your life thus far. The world gives us plenty of chances to feel that way every day (and if you have children, I'm sure you've noticed that they will happily point your inadequacies out as well).

Instead, imagine you and I are having drinks in a wine bar, the soft afternoon light filtering in from the street while we enjoy a glass or two and swap ideas on things we'd like to accomplish before heading to that wine bar in the sky. You suddenly realize, why couldn't I finally try that hobby I've always been meaning to pick up? Or why couldn't I go on that trip I've dreamed of? Or maybe, in the course of the conversation, you even think of things you want to try that had never occurred to you.

That's what I did, of course. Had countless glasses and hours of conversation with well-traveled and accomplished people, listening to their goals and dreams, mentally adding the things that appealed to me to my own list. You'll hear from many of them in this book. Their perspectives and recounting of their experiences and ideas were enough to make me want to cut the conversation short and get going!

One friend told me he wanted to "die with his boots on."

“But Bryan,” I pointed out, “you don’t wear cowboy boots. You wear velvet slippers.”

Yes he did, he admitted, in fact he had thirty pairs of custom-made slippers from a shoemaker in Venice. “Must go to Venice for velvet slippers,” I thought to myself, smiling and sipping gin as he spoke. Simply must.

So what exactly do I mean by a “well-lived life”? Do I think we need to earn our spot on the planet and make full use of our talents, imaginations, and drives? No. Here is what a well-lived life means to me:

- ◆ That you have showered love and affection on those around you and received it in return.
- ◆ That the world is a better place because of your energy, generosity, creativity, and efforts.
- ◆ That you had the chance to get out in the world and poke around, not just to observe, but to fully engage with other people in other places.

- ◆ That you had a hand in creating something, somewhere that will outlive you.

In other words, I believe that to pursue a well-lived life you need to get out there and make something happen. Participate in life, rather than observe or drown in the dreaded feeling that it's just passing you by. But it's more than just putting another notch in your belt. Much was made of President Obama's ten-minute stop at Stonehenge during a state visit to England. "Knocked that off my bucket list," he said, climbing back into his motorcade and heading off to the next meeting. Is that all there is to some bucket lists, to merely view something of interest while making a mental check next to that item? There's something quite sad about that.

This book is designed to get you engaged in your life so that you fully experience it on all levels. Planning a trip to Paris? Great. Why not also plan to become a *part* of Paris? To have a business in Paris, to learn a skill in Paris, to rehab a house in Paris, to model clothes in Paris, to paint in Paris, to run a marathon in Paris, to make wine in Paris, to have your hair done in Paris... Are you getting the idea here?

Of course you no doubt already have a hundred ideas about the things you'd like to do in your life. You may have been keeping a list for years now. I hope that this book will help you find many interesting ways to add to the list of the things you've longed to do at some point in your life or figure out how you can turn your own bucket-list wishes into realities. Think of this book and the ideas inside as an extra bit of frosting that you have swiped off the edge of life's cake.

You'll find all kinds of bucket list ideas in this book—there are travel ideas, food-related ideas, sporty ideas—but I've also included creative challenges, lofty goals, and extravagant desires. What do I mean by those terms?

- ♦ Creative Challenges are things you can make, items of permanence, ideas that will stretch your talents and abilities and perhaps help you develop some new ones.
- ♦ Lofty Goals are just that—lofty as in way above our heads—so why not reach up and try? Save the world. Invent a better mouse-trap. Write the great American novel. Leave

something behind. Create something of permanence. Visit the over-the-top places you dream of, and enjoy the unique things you want to do once you get there.

- ◆ Extravagant Desires? Okay, let's just say it...these are things you'd like to own. To have in your life on a daily basis. Like the custom-made velvet slippers that my friend Bryan wears. Do you have to pay for your desires? You might. But there are creative ways to bring what you want into your life for less, so those are also included.

What are your creative challenges? Lofty goals? Extravagant desires? You will have to decide for yourself. We want you to consider all of these ideas, not just the ones that you know will appeal to who you are right now. Because who you are right now might change in the future...and one of these ideas might bring about that change.

CAN I AFFORD MY BUCKET LIST?

Daydreaming is free. Acting on your dreams can sometimes be quite costly. Of course, we would all love to have lives of financial ease and good fortune, where our wildest dreams are well within our means. But what if that isn't the case? Are there ways to make your dreams come true on a budget? What about on a shoestring? What about for free? Depending on what your dream entails, sure. Here are a few methods to bootstrap that bucket list:

- ♦ **Ask Your Friends to Join**—Traveling with a group is almost always cheaper than going alone. Being part of a group puts you in a position to bargain for a better deal. And if what you want is costly—a week in a castle or a month on a sailboat—getting a group together to split the cost might bring it all into reach. So share your dream any chance you get and look for those like-minded folks whose eyes light up when you describe it.
- ♦ **Start a Special Account**—A dedicated savings account earmarked for your dream

trip or purchase can be a great incentive. Resolve to put in every stray bit of cash you come across—the two hundred you brought in from your garage sale, the twenty bucks you got returning aluminum cans, or the money you made selling your daughter's old textbooks on eBay.

- ♦ **Try to Get Comped**—Yes, in some circumstances travel writers get parts of their trips comped. And as a consequence, hordes of hopeful folks have declared themselves “writers.” Travel writers for major magazines and papers don't actually accept free travel. That's against company policy. However, plenty of writers for small sites and publications do. You will need to get an assignment first, to pitch your article idea to an editor and get it approved, before you can truthfully tell a hotel that you are working on a story.
- ♦ **Work for It**—Big cruise lines always have speakers onboard. Are you a public speaker with a niche that fits the theme

or destination of a cruise? Cruise lines also sometimes employ men to dance with the

single women on board... Just a thought for the retired man with a talent for the dance floor.

GoFundMe has thousands of active campaigns from hopeful travelers with head-lines like “Female World Trip on Motorcycle.” She’d raised \$6,683 from eighty-eight donors when I checked. “Will Schmidt’s Canada to Mexico Paddle” had raised \$8,530 toward his goal from seventy-nine donors, and “Battleborn Pacific Challenge,” a team of guys who rowed from San Francisco to Hawaii, raised more than £16,000, or about \$24,000!

♦ **Crowdsource—**

Websites like Kickstarter and GoFundMe make it possible to ask friends and strangers to put money into your dreams. Kickstarter might fund your bucket list dream of producing a small film or opening a vegan sandwich shop. GoFundMe leans more toward asking for contributions to travel.

But do tread carefully. You don’t want to lose friends over this.

- ♦ **Volunteer—**If your money is low and your hopes are high, perhaps volunteering

at your dream destination is a possibility. But not every place will allow volunteers free access. Burning Man, for instance, welcomes volunteer help during the year and during the event itself, but warns that helping doesn't lead to free admission. So keep that in mind as you do your research.

ASK, AND YE JUST MIGHT RECEIVE

Why do some people lead such interesting lives and have such amazing experiences, while others just lead sort of bland and humdrum lives? Could be that the people in the first group have learned the art of the ask. It seems like such a simple thing, really, but it can be quite intimidating to think about. At a famed restaurant that everyone is talking about, why not ask the waiter if you can go back into the kitchen and meet the chef? The answer may be no, and there is no shame in that. But if the answer is yes, think of the extraordinary opportunity that just fell into your lap! A behind-the-scenes look at the world of an artist.

So think about it...who do you want to meet? Go ahead and try to make it happen. Make blind phone

calls, send out inquiring letters and emails, see if you can get in touch with someone you find fascinating. What do you want to know? Never be afraid to call on experts or skilled amateurs. They love to talk about their passions. Where do you want to go? Always ask for help in getting behind the scenes. What is behind that door marked Off Limits anyway? Ask the guide and they just might be in the mood to show you. Take charge of building your own interesting life by speaking up and asking for something unusual.

Okay. Ready to work on your bucket list? Let's get started at amping up your life of adventure! Take a look at these ideas and see how many spark your fancy. And most of all, have fun.



GALAS, PARTIES, AND GET-TOGETHERS:

Marvelous Ways to Mix, Mingle,
and Meet New Friends

Opening Night

Longing for an evening of all-out glamour, with men in black tie and women in glittering, long dresses? Why not attend the opening night of an orchestra or opera company?

To be clear, this is not an inexpensive undertaking in most places. For example, the least expensive ticket to the New York Philharmonic's most recent opening-night gala was \$1,500 for a pre-concert reception, the concert itself, and a postconcert dinner. The San Francisco Symphony the same year had a \$170 opening-night gala ticket that included the chance to enter the music hall on a red carpet, see

a concert that included Bonnie Raitt singing with the orchestra, and then attend a late-night after-party in the street outside with dancing, desserts, and the sense that you were one of the VIPs.

Are these events packed with serious lovers of opera and symphonic music? No, the organizers of these high-priced fetes understand that many attendees just like to get dressed up and attend a fun evening of entertainment and music, so the programming is mostly lighter fare. Sometimes opening nights feature interesting new works that the company has commissioned. New York City Ballet likes to pair new works with new costumes by big-name designers for an extra bit of oomph on opening night. So take a look at what your area's orchestra offers, and shake the dust off your best tux or gown.

Create Your Own Club!

Feeling excluded by some social group? Wishing you had a close group of like-minded friends with similar interests? Recently moved to a new area and longing to meet new people? There's no time like the present to form your own social club. You could cast your net wide and form a group in your area to hike

together or taste wine or discuss current events. Or you could cast a very narrow net, forming a group of people your own age with the same educational background and specific point of view as you. Sounds like many other clubs out there, doesn't it? Ah, but this time you get to name it!

For example, longtime journalist Judith Horstman and a few other like-minded writers had plenty of writing groups to belong to, but wanted a purely social club with their fellow scribes. "Writers Who Wine" was born to meet their need to hang out with other writers and not feel the need to compete. Starting from just a handful of people, the Facebook group now has more than four hundred members and hosts events in several western cities.

Is there much administrative headache involved in starting a club? Not if you don't want there to be. "It took ten minutes to form the club on Facebook, and we send out a group message to members once a month announcing which bar we will be meeting in," Judith says. "If no one shows up to the 'meeting,' it isn't a problem. At least we have some nice wine to drink."

So how can you find folks to join up with? How do you get the word out about the kind of social

club you wish to create? Simple. Type this into your browser—www.meetup.com. Find the icon that says “Start a Meetup Group.” Click on it. Follow the instructions. There, how simple is that?

Go behind the Scenes on Broadway, at the Opera, or Anywhere

Ever listen jealously to a friend’s long tale about the time they got to go backstage at a Broadway show, or were ushered into the inner sanctum of a museum, historic house, or national monument? How’d they pull that one off, anyway? Chances are they were “friends” of the organization.

This may seem pretentious or like an unfair hurdle, but it’s not necessarily. The key here is to join. Donate. Volunteer. If you are willing to give your time and your money, private worlds will open up to you, giving you the chance to live your dreams by going behind the scenes at one of the places you love. This doesn’t have to cost pots of money, mind you. Even joining at the lowest level of a “friends of”

organization may entitle you to special treatment when you visit. Shorter lines and secret entrances to some museums; discounts in the gift shop, to be sure. Or how does this sound? Friends of the High Line, a group that supports the inner-city park in New York City, gives a specially designed Coach bag to those who support at the very highest level! At some places, all you have to do is donate your time to get special backstage access and privileges. Volunteers for the Chicago Architecture Foundation, for instance, get free membership, a gift shop discount, and opportunities for continuing education.

As you begin to plan a long-dreamed-of visit to a special site, go to the website and see if a supporters group is listed. If so, what special benefits will you get? A private tour at a particular level? Invitations to special receptions and galas? If this is something on your bucket list, even joining at a higher level for just one year might give you the chance to live your dream.

Host Your Own Literary Salon

No, I don't mean open a hair salon with lots of books or magazines for your customers to read. This is a salon strictly in the literary sense, like those found in Paris and London in centuries past, where attendees come together for stimulating conversation about the events of the day.

The most famous literary salons were hosted by women, so what an honor for us to be able to continue the tradition of helping to spread knowledge and intellectual curiosity. How can you create your own salon? Simple. Invite the most interesting people you know, even some you may only know in passing, to gather at your place. Email and social media make it easy to be bold in reaching out to people you may only be vaguely acquainted with but want to get to know better. A beautifully handwritten invitation (or a nice online invitation from a website like PaperlessPost.com or Evite.com) can also go a long way toward convincing an interesting someone on the edge of your social circle to take a chance on coming to your event.

Sunday afternoons are particularly good times for these, as they provide a pleasant and relaxing way to wind down the weekend with smart talk. Set

out some good wine, good food, or small bites, and circulate among your guests. You might want to announce a theme in advance, perhaps a topic drawn from the day's headlines to spark discussion and the flow of ideas or thoughts. Or you might announce a challenge, "What can we do to save the planet?" or "Does anyone have any useful ideas on how to tame traffic downtown?"

Revolutions grew out of some salons, as did great works of art and literature. Who knows what your efforts might produce!

Mr. Hearst Will See You Now

Is there a more iconic architectural fantasy of the American dream than Hearst Castle along the central California coast? Not only does it conjure up the image of its wealthy and eccentric owner, who shipped castles and monasteries back from Europe in crates to be reassembled inside his house, but it also comes with a healthy dose of Hollywood

glamour. It was the place to see and be seen for decades in the early days of the movie business. Everyone came to stay for the weekend, arriving by train or boat.

The castle has long been open to the public for tours. But if you open your checkbook wide enough, you can also put on your finest holiday gear and attend the occasional black tie Holiday Feast. Held in the Refectory Dining Hall of Casa Grande, the main house, the atmosphere is one of regal elegance. You can live out your dream of being William Randolph Hearst and his lady love, Marion Davies. After dinner and dessert, the guests retire to Hearst's private movie theater to view a vintage film.

Attending a gala dinner at Hearst Castle is not an inexpensive undertaking. Recent ticket prices for the holiday event were \$1,000 per person for members of Friends of Hearst Castle and \$1,250 for non-members. The event sells out quickly and is not held every year. Join the Explorers Club

Clubs. We mentioned them often. Why? Because...well, they're so darned clubby. And if you can get in the door, you must be clubby too. Spend an Evening in a Wine Cave

Close your eyes and imagine the scene. You are below the earth—far below the earth, in some cases—in a cave with curved walls and surrounded by aging wines in oak barrels. The air is the perfect temperature, candlelight flickers on the walls, and a large table is set with gleaming crystal glasses and china plates. Dinner should be like this every night...

“It is an experience of a lifetime,” sommelier Roxanne Langer says of dinner in a wine cave. “You are getting a winery chef who knows the wines perfectly and can pair the food accordingly. The romantic setting, the food and wine pairing—it

is an incomparable evening for any food and wine lover.”

Can you just show up at a wine cave with a picnic basket and sit down? No. These experiences need to be closely coordinated with the winery staff. Although many wineries with caves are open to corporate events, hosting your own private dinner party with friends might entail a little convincing. Joining the winery’s club and receiving monthly shipments of wine often includes access to events in the wine caves and could get you closer to using it yourself.

Ladera, in California’s Napa wine country, allows members of their Premiere Crew Wine Club to host private dinners in the wine caves. Based around a stunning stone building built in the 1880s, Ladera’s wine cave dinners are held on an enormous redwood table made from the original floors and lit by candles made by the owners’ daughter.

Food and wine are not the only delights you might find in a wine cave. Music is also found belowground.

To brew is human...to ferment, divine!” You can make cheese, yogurt, pickles, kimchi, and once you are confident of your yeasty skills, why not make some wine? Before investing in expensive specialized equipment, see if there is an amateur

winemaking club in your area that you can join and have access to their equipment.

Find Your Own Food

So much ink is being devoted these days to the concept of “farm to fork.” Very chic. But can you skip the farm and get right to finding food for your fork? Definitely. Few things are as elemental and yet intensely satisfying as the experience of gathering your own food. I don’t mean getting it from a grocery store or from someone else’s efforts, like some poor sous chef slaving away in a hot restaurant kitchen, but rather going out into the field, into the forest, or down to the shore to get it yourself.

Hunting, fishing, and foraging bring us back to our earliest days as a species and remind us to appreciate the

Although I didn't grow up in a fishing family, a few years back I began crabbing in Puget Sound with thrilling and delicious success. How did I learn? I bought a book called *How to Catch Crab*. I'm not always in the Pacific Northwest though, so the fastest way to get my own food from nature is to walk out the door and pluck dandelion greens from the back lawn. Wash them thoroughly, then boil for three or four minutes. Drain and chop them into small pieces, and add them to rice or anything that you think needs a pop of flavor and color. And then for fun, casually mention to your guests that they are eating weeds.

alternatives. Eating was pretty much a hit-or-miss experience for millennia. Some days the fishing was good. Some days the game was slow enough to catch. Some days you stumbled into a field of ripe berries and other edible plants. And some days your daily search turned up nothing. You won't take things for granted once you've had that experience.

Live in the city away from the natural world? If you are an urbanite, you can still feed yourself. If you live near the coast, grab a shovel and head to the shore when the tide is low to dig for clams. Lower a baited crab ring off a dock. Join up with a fishing charter.

If the ocean is nowhere nearby, you can take a class in identifying and harvesting native edible plants. And never be afraid to ask someone more experienced than you are for help. Outdoor people love to

share what they know, so speak up and ask for help and advice.

Hank Shaw, food blogger and forager extraordinaire, says in his book *Hunt, Gather, Cook*: “We live in an edible world. It’s all around us, if you look closely... Knowing your plants and animals, learning to forage and fish and hunt, and then understanding what to do with what you have found is, for many, a deeply spiritual experience.”

Keep an eye out for fruit trees in unusual places, such as hanging over the edge of a fence in an alley or forgotten in the corner of an empty lot. Native Californian George Basye grew up around fig trees and keeps an eye on an ancient tree that no one claims at the far end of a grocery-store parking lot. “When they are ripening I am there two to three times a week. No better breakfast than a fig you picked yourself.” Watch for wild berries on your summertime hikes. When you’re picking berries, purple fingers and a stained shirt are signs of great accomplishment. Cobblers and jams will taste so much better than when they are made with fruit from your grocery store’s produce section.

Once you start looking at the world around you, trying to spot what is free and edible, your perspective shifts and you may well be drawn into other related

activities. Hank Shaw learned to hunt in his forties. Where might this new skill take you?

But now George can look out his kitchen window and see the wall every day, reliving the experience he had with his son so many years ago. “Sometimes it brings tears to my eyes,” he said. “He’s grown now and off on his own, but there it is, the wall we made together.”

Open Your Own Bookstore

In decades past, owning a bar was a common romantic daydream. Perhaps it was fueled by our culture’s obsession with *Cheers*. Then everyone wanted to own a coffee shop with its own small coffee-bean roaster and locally produced milk. Perhaps the popularity of *Friends* had something to do with this? Now, many daydreams have shifted toward the romantic idea of owning an independent bookstore. Is this a dream of yours? Running a small bookstore has never been an

easy way to make a buck, but with fewer big chain stores, a touch of backlash against the online sellers, and the “buy local” movement, the number of independent bookstores in the country is on the upswing.

The American Booksellers Association helps encourage store owners. Every year the organization sponsors a Booksellers School with the consulting firm Paz & Associates where you can learn the basics or improve on the bookish skills you already have.

If the expense and responsibility of owning an actual shop and running it day to day doesn't fit your lifestyle or your pocketbook, why not put up a free library instead? Little Free Libraries were started in 2009 by a couple of guys in Wisconsin and have now spread to more than 15,000 around the world. For a few hundred dollars you can buy an already-made book box to put up in front of your house or business. Or you can download plans and build your own. And then decorate it any way you want!

How does it work? You get the library rolling by putting out books that you are happy to see others take for free. Ask your neighbors to add books they no longer want to the mix. Delighted passersby will notice your Little Free Library as they walk down the street, open the box's door to peruse the titles,

and take whatever appeals to them. If they are from the area, perhaps they'll return and add some of their own books to be discovered by strangers. And it goes on and on... You get the pleasure and good karma of being the local literary spot without the headache of making the monthly rent. And rather than spending hours reshelving books and dusting, you can straighten up the library in minutes!

Stepping it up a bit, you could also start your own literary reading series or author reading series. Not every town has a bookstore or public library with an existing structure for

visiting writers. So you can step into the void and make one happen. Start a Little Free Library author series on your own front lawn. Or stand and read the classics together one evening. Poetry. Famous speeches. The themes and topics are endless.

Who could have predicted that when Todd Bol of Hudson, Wisconsin, built a small wooden model of the one-room schoolhouse his mother once taught in, filled it with books, and stuck it on a post on his front lawn with a sign reading "free books," it would become a sensation? His "Little Free Library" idea went from the simple goal of building community and sharing books with his neighbors in Wisconsin to 15,000 replicas created by others around the world in less than a decade. If you are pursuing an idea that you are passionate about, share it! Who knows where it could lead.

You've read the articles about how to keep your brain sharp. They appear constantly in the newspaper and in various magazines targeted to, um, mature audiences. So you have already heard all of the ways to keep your brain young and agile as the years go by...crossword puzzles, foreign languages, or musical instruments. And yes, do as many of those as make you happy.

But is there a sexier, more dashing way to work your brain without seeming so sedate and mature? Why not go back to driving a standard shift transmission? A standard transmission lends itself to a more physical connection between driver and car. With shifter firmly in hand, you could be operating with the car, instead of just operating it.

Real estate developer Dain Domich explains why he is a devoted stick-shift man:

The interesting aspect about the manual gear box, the "stick shift," is it gives the driver freedom to play

the engine. There is nothing quite like bipping the throttle and feeling the motor surge as the fuel ignites and it runs up through its natural power band. Every motor has its own rhythmic cadence... its own sweet spot. There is a particular exhaust note in every engine's power band that hits a vowel-like sound... Some have a murmur, some howl, and some hit a French horn note. Some just roar and rumble restlessly. The "stick" lets you play the instrument. Pity the confines of a motor harnessed to an automatic transmission like a horse hitched to a wagon, envying the spirited mustang's free-running gait.

Always a fan of cars with standard transmissions (I've had four over the years), in 2013 I bought a 1966 Jaguar sedan with not just a standard transmission, but also right-hand drive. Talk about needing to pay attention to what is going on while I drive! Every trip is an adventure and a serious mental workout. And yes, it totally beats doing the *New York Times* crossword puzzle every day as a way to keep my brain nimble.

Very few new cars come with a standard-shift transmission option, and nearly all in the American car market are automatic. Small sports cars like the Mazda Miata or smaller economy models like the Honda Fit are the exception, but seeking out a modestly priced

car with a shifter on the floor is also an excuse to go back in time to the cars you admired and envied when you were younger. Was there a '65 Mustang you always envied in the next-door neighbor's driveway? Perhaps an Oldsmobile or even a Cougar? Being able to shift is a skill you should always have at the ready. Who knows when you might find yourself navigating hairpin turns on the Italian coast in a vintage Fiat? The car fan website BenchSeat Chronicles is always looking for stories from readers about their fondest car memories. Perhaps you have one or two to share. Or will have, once you take up driving around town with your new stick shift.

I took a class that San Francisco Opera offers in their Overture program and was surprised to find myself on a Monday night in a room full of other adults. Somehow, I thought I might be the only one actually interested in the topic...but no. Fifty people wanted to learn how opera “works.” We wrote librettos and listened to young composers play and sing the words we’d just hammered out. We learned what the lives of the musicians are like in the pit and how the costumes are made. It was a delightful behind-the-scenes look at a world so few of us ever get to enter. I will never watch opera again without wondering who painted the scenery and how many singers have worn that one costume over the years. And at the end, they passed out applications to be walk-on, nonsinging supernumeraries!

production. These small roles are called supernumeraries, or “supers.” The application is on their website, or you can email supers@sfopera.com for information. The application asks for a recent head shot and wants to know if you have had musical training or theatrical classes. And your measurements, so they will know whether you can fit into the already existing costumes. (Operas rent them from whom-ever owns the actual production. They seldom make everything for every opera.)

Keep an eye on the announced schedule to see what operas are being performed in upcoming seasons. Not every opera needs a large group of people

milling about for a village scene or dancing at a wedding. An opera like *War and Peace*, on the other hand, needs more supers than seems possible. The Met put out a public call for supernumeraries when they mounted that production in 2007 because they needed more soldiers for the battle scenes! Check with your local opera production company to see what they are up to and the process by which they fill super roles.

Develop Your Own Line of Food Products

For some of us, the idea of opening a restaurant has a great deal of bucket-list appeal. “One of these days... I will serve up my grandmother’s famed ravioli... I will show the world how the best pie is made... I will wow my customers with my own secret formula for a well-seared steak.” We all have favorite types of food around which our dream restaurant would be built.

But opening a restaurant isn’t cheap and, in most circumstances, is highly risky. Go for it if you have money you can afford to lose, but if that doesn’t

describe your bank account, are there other ways to feed your need?

One of the biggest costs is a commercial kitchen, one that the health department deems worthy of serving food to strangers. If your dream involves one family recipe you'd like to share with the world, you can rent time in a commercial kitchen to prepare it and then sell it at farmers markets and food festivals. Pasta sauces, mustards, vinegars, and many family barbecue recipes are made and marketed this way.

If selling your food in bottles and cans doesn't satisfy your longing to serve an entire meal, perhaps you can offer to host a dinner party in your home as a charity auction item. It will give you the same experience of serving your food to strangers for money (although the money goes to the charity, with you assuming the cost of food preparation as your donation), and you will be able to do it in your own home.

Become an Art Curator

Owning an art gallery sounds posh, doesn't it? It also sounds like a difficult way to make money or an easy way to lose it. But if your dream is to be the one

who chooses the artists and promotes the art, there are ways to make that happen in your life.

A phenomenon called ONO, or One Night Only, is a popular way to hang art outside a formal gallery setting. You could turn your own house or apartment into an ONO gallery simply by taking down what you have hanging on your walls now to create a blank canvas and removing some of the room's furniture to create better flow. Approach the artists you admire about doing a limited-time frame showing and art reception, hang the art and send out the invites, and presto, you are the owner of your own personal art gallery. If you succeed on your first try, do it a few times every year and create a regular event in the art community.

Don't want strangers in your own space? Perhaps there is a vacant building or office space whose owner would let you use it for a limited time. Be brave and ask the owner. They might be delighted with the prospect of hundreds of people coming to their building and view it as a marketing opportunity.

Attend Jewelry School at Van Cleef & Arpels

Do you love high-end jewelry? Are you curious about how artisans like Fabergé or Cartier created all

those glittering trinkets? The French jewel house Van Cleef & Arpels recently opened its gilded doors to the public in a small way by allowing a select few to peek behind the scenes. L'École Van Cleef & Arpels gives aficionados the chance to explore the secret world of jewelry in Paris, “enabling enthusiasts to become enlightened amateurs.” Classes are also held throughout the year in Paris and less often in places like Hong Kong and New York. The Paris classes and lectures are held in French and in English on topics such as “Symbols and Power of Jewels,” “The Story of Talisman Jewels,” and “Art Nouveau,” as well as a more in-depth, behind-the-scenes look at Van Cleef & Arpels itself. Take a look at the schedule, and if you are going to be in Paris anyway, why not attend one of these unique classes?

On a far smaller (and less expensive) scale, there are countless places to learn the basics of jewelry making. Art schools, community college classes, craft stores, and bead stores all offer classes to get you started in developing your own unique bejeweled look.

Around and Around You Go: Drive a NASCAR Car

NASCAR is one of the biggest sports around, attracting huge crowds to the stands and even larger viewing audiences. Are you a major NASCAR fan? Does the idea of driving one of those cars fill you with excitement? If that's what you want, the opportunity is closer at hand than you might think.

The Dale Jarrett Racing Adventure offers racing experiences at a number of tracks around the country, from Talladega Speedway to the Chicagoland Speedway and points in between. Something to consider before pursuing this—you do need to be slim and nimble enough to slide into the driver's seat through the window. There are no doors on a race car! Instructors will walk you through the hand signals you need to understand as you whiz by the pit crew, teach you how to safely enter and exit the track, and then away you go...

The cost of three laps around one of the tracks is fairly reasonable, around \$200. The price goes up

from there, with the chance to drive forty or sixty laps priced in packages north of \$2,000. Keep an eye on your credit card bill, because sometimes this kind of opportunity can be had by cashing in your points.

Rick Gorsline described his experience behind the wheel at an Arizona track like this:

It was early with the sun just peeking over the horizon. I was headed for the Rusty Wallace Racing Experience and my chance to drive with no speed limit. I drove there that morning at street legal speed, savoring the vision of myself at the Phoenix International Raceway, following in the tire tracks of the legends of NASCAR with a big grin on my face. But my emotions were a roller coaster. After I arrived and had an hour-long training session that included how to eject in a crash (which occur almost daily) and dressed in a red flameproof jumpsuit, I had a serious case of the jitters and my adrenaline was out of control.

I rode my first three laps with a trainer who pointed out the line and braking points on the curves with hand signals. It was too loud to talk.

Then it was my turn. I crawled in feetfirst through the driver window. At age seventy-one, it was no small feat. I attached the seat belts: crotch, chest,

shoulders, waist, neck brace. I got the signal. Time for me and my Budweiser number 6 to enter the track. Sixteen laps with 500 horsepower. Bright-colored cars rocketed by, the noise deafening, and I joined them.

It was much more of a rush than zip-lining. More like skiing fast and slightly out of control. Every lap I tried to increase speed. I didn't go as fast as the pros, but I'm glad I was there that morning. The drive home at seventy mph felt like tortoise speed.

Sound like something you'd be up for? Then go for it.

If you have time and some funds for a hobby, the beautiful wooden instrument is a marvel even to hold, besides learning about the craft behind the making of the instrument

and the stories it tells you as you begin to bow its strings. I can't think of a better instrument for an adult beginner or an adult who wishes to begin again now that years have been added in between.

Mark has developed his own string learning program, the O'Connor Method, with an emphasis on learning American music. "The pieces in my book series are especially powerful as they tell the history and story of Americana and its multiplicity of culture and ideas. Even the beginning tunes are professional tunes that can be added to and shaped by individual expression. An American school of string playing is on the rise and people are starting to take notice."

Seeking an unusual Valentine's Day gift, I asked a professional musician friend to give me a few lessons on the recorder. She taught me the basics and then together we studied the sheet music to Elvis Presley's "Love Me Tender." I gave it a shot, practiced it over and over, and then performed it for my partner on the big day. Did he recognize the song? Well, not really, but when I told him afterward what it was, he was quite touched by my attempt. Time to keep practicing...

Since 1992, ordinary nonarchaeologist folks have been able to help the pros on a site in Cyprus. Even actor Bill Murray has shown up to dig and sift. If being an archaeologist was your childhood dream, perhaps this is a chance to live it.

This is not an inexpensive undertaking; the price of the Exec-U-Dig program is about \$10,000 for the week! But there is a small upside to the hefty price tag (beyond getting a really cool experience). Joan Breton Connelly, the program director for this New York University project, points out that the fee itself is a fully tax-deductible contribution. “Participants also pay for their room and board, which is not tax deductible,” she says. “Pricing here varies according to the taste of the participants. Some wish to live with the team—this is quite reasonable (though we have no air-conditioning and few creature comforts); others wish to stay up the road at a four- or five-star hotel.”

What is the actual experience like? Joan described it this way:

Participants are full-fledged members of the Yeronisos team, traveling out by fishing boat to

the island at 6:00 a.m. each morning for a full day of digging. They receive careful training in correct techniques for using trowels, handpicks, dental tools, and brushes; the logic behind stratigraphic excavation and how to “read” the earth; as well as best practices in the removal, documentation, and conservation of finds.

We return to the mainland at 2:00 p.m. for a hearty lunch, siesta, and swim in the pristine, aquamarine Aegean Sea. Then off to the sherds tables at 6:00 p.m. for washing and sorting pottery fragments, working on the giant “jigsaw puzzle” of sherds that join into whole vases. The dig day comes to a close with a leisurely, candlelit dinner beneath the grape arbor, giving the team time to unwind, enjoy local wine, discuss the day’s discoveries, and share adventure stories before heading off to bed.

Exec-U-Diggers also enjoy special team excursions to local museums, archaeological sites, monasteries, and nature preserves. This enables them to experience firsthand the richness of Cypriot cultural heritage and ecology, to hike the stunning trails of the Avakas Gorge and Akamas Peninsula, and to visit the Lara Bay Sea Turtle Conservation Station.

Learn a Long-Lost Skill for Today

Yesterday, tomorrow. Yestermorrow. A place where you can learn skills from the past that will help you in the future. This design/build school teaches more than a hundred different workshops on topics like traditional hand-tool chair-making, historic preservation, earthen oven building, straw-bale design, and timber framing.

The school was founded in 1980 in Waitsfield, Vermont, by a group of architects and builders who wanted to change the way we build houses and communities. The founders believed that building skills and architecture should be learned together seamlessly, in the hope that better design would emerge as

a result. Students are of all ages and backgrounds, but these are not drop-in, casual, weekend courses.

The Art of Stone, for instance, runs from Sunday to Friday to teach students the design-and-build basics they need to build an arched entryway. An even more intensive experience is offered in a course taught in an abandoned village in Italy where the students spend fifteen days learning to preserve and restore historic masonry buildings in the Piedmont.

Let Me Count the Ways... Become a Poet

Was there a poetry phase in your distant past? A year of high school when most of your time was devoted to penning tragic but romantic odes to a fellow student who—insert deep sigh here—was totally unaware of your existence? So many of us did this...and then, blushing, put away our adolescent attempts and went on to lead responsible, nonpoetic lives.

But how about now? Why not become a poet in this next phase of your life? Why not sit down and pen a romantic ode to your lifetime partner? Or an ode to the rosebush in your front yard, your trusty

Volvo, or perhaps the grower at the farmers market from whom you buy those amazing tomatoes.

How do you get started? Simple. Get out of the way of your own emotions. Instead of trying to make every word perfect, just write down everything that comes to mind. Pretend you are listening to jazz, and just jam with whatever comes out of your pen onto the page.

Do you need to share what you have written? Not if you don't want to. All writers keep something to themselves, so this can be your private stash. But if you do decide to brave sharing your poetry with your love interest, let him or her know what is going on. You don't want your efforts to be met with nervous titters.

Is love the only thing poets write about? Of course not. Write one about walking the dog. Write about composing your will. Write about making the bed. Drinking your coffee. Driving your car. Life is a poem. Write it down.

Take Up an Art and Create Often

Are your days of uninhibited, childlike creativity far behind you? Do you remember high-school art class

fondly but haven't tried to draw, paint, or sculpt since then? What are you waiting for? It's time to dive back in and paddle around in your creativity. No one is watching; there are no grades to be earned; and you don't even need a teacher unless you seek one out.

A trip to your local art-supply store will give you ample inspiration and allow you to quietly dabble in whatever appeals to you most. Once you've got your creative mojo on, start looking for instruction through adult ed classes or museum activity days...or just do whatever feels right when the mood strikes. If you like what you make, put it out there for the world to see. Decorate your yard with your sculpture. Hang your paintings in the hallway. Send a drawing to your sweetie.

Art makes the world smile back at you. "It anchors you," says Ingrid Lundquist about her return to making art after an absence of thirty or so years. A painter in college, she now spends hours a week on her photography and has begun to travel for that sole purpose.

Award-winning cookbook and food journalist Elaine Corn took up ceramics because "it is the opposite of journalism. No deadlines. No facts. Mentors rather than editors. A world of shapes and colors and

uses. The entire process calms me while keeping my hands and mind moving.” Sounds very seductive. Elaine does point out one drawback though: “The only thing that art and journalism have in common are an audience and unreliable pay.”

Start a Journal—and *Stick to It*

Finally, you have the time to journal! Yes, you’ve thought for a long time about developing the habit. But when? You were too busy with other things... but maybe now? Writing in a journal is an interesting and introspective habit, and best of all, it *doesn’t* have to be as all-consuming as it might seem. Start by taking a few minutes at the end of the day to jot down things that were of interest to you. As you get in the swing of it, you will start to spend more time on your descriptions. A few words about a trip to the grocery store might lead to a paragraph describing the conversation you overheard in the pet food aisle and then to a longer recollection about a favorite pet from your childhood. Who knows where a journal entry could lead?

You don’t have to write your journal in memoir form, of course. But close your eyes and imagine

one of your descendants holding your handwritten journal in their hands years in the future. Wouldn't you have been delighted to stumble across something like that in your attic from someone in your own family? To have access to their inner thoughts and their immediate reflections on what was happening around them during events we only get to read about in history books?

So do it for the future. Get yourself a blank journal and sit down to write. The future is asking for your thoughts.

I've been attending music workshops for over twenty years, and writing workshops as well, but songwriting camp was a chance to step outside my comfort level and combine both interests."

"We were a varied group," she explains. "A pastor exploring her musical talents, a rock guitarist who wanted a chance for his own voice to be heard, a physician who wrote songs about biochemistry... Workshops like this bring amazing people together who love learning from each other and sharing their own gifts."

Historic reenactments are everywhere. At Williamsburg, Virginia, Sutter's Fort in Sacramento, and every Civil War site in between, dedicated volunteers in authentic costume are working to convey the proper period.

Why do they do it? "Historic reenactments can bring important insights," says Sue Pearson. "Whether it's a medieval festival or a Civil War drama, when you step into costume and character you begin to understand not how different we are but how much the same. There is a sense of timeless community when you become part of living history. And from that community comes an understanding that we are all connected—then, now, and always."

Sue is new to the reenactment world. She participates in an all-female militia called the Nancy Harts in LaGrange, Georgia. Why? "My great-grandmother joined the real Nancy Harts during the Civil War at the age of fourteen. She and forty-five other armed

women met the Union Army on the edge of their town, and their spirits were enough to convince the Union general to spare the town from destruction. When I put on that dress a hundred and fifty years later and lift a rifle, I feel Addie's strength flow through me and carry over into other parts of my life."

Is there a dramatic story from your ancestors that would draw you to reenact? Gold Rush explorers, early farmers, Revolutionary soldiers, or maybe you can even reach back in time to wear medieval clothes at a Renaissance fair in your area. Try being someone else in a different time period for a while, and who knows how that might influence who you are today.

Down in Front! Host Your Own Themed Movie Nights

Are you a serious movie buff? One who has watched *Cinema Paradiso* over and over with great longing, imagining yourself as the proprietor of an old-fashioned movie house in a quaint small town (preferably in Italy)? Even if you aren’t chosen for an official residency, set up your easel and get to work. Sit on a rock with your sketchbook or your journal. Let the scenery lead your creativity in new directions. Unpack your camera gear and climb on top of your car to get the perfect shot, à la Ansel Adams. He didn’t have an official residency either, you know.

Beverly Lewis with the Placer County Film Commission says, “We get current information all the time on who is planning to shoot and when. Almost all films need extras.”

And once you play a bit part (or just stroll through a frame or two) in a film that plays on the film festival circuit, then why not go? Imagine the excitement of sitting anonymously in the audience while the movie you watched being filmed is on the screen before you. Even if your scene never survives the final cut, hey, you were *there*. You were part of this in a way few others can claim.

Having once been an extra, you might get hooked and do it again. “I got a call to be one of thousands of extras in the Brad Pitt movie *Moneyball*. Those stands needed to be filled somehow,” said Marie Vines. She’d connected with a casting company years before

But wait, isn't filming a documentary complicated and beyond the reach of most of us? Not anymore. As with so many things, technology is firmly on the side of the amateur.

“Technological advances have made it much more affordable to film a documentary,” said author Richard Poe. A devoted kayaker, Richard was fascinated by the art of kayak rolling and, after learning it himself, felt others should be exposed to the idea.

There's something magical about rolling a kayak. You turn the boat upside down, then roll it back up again. It's like conquering death. After years of kayaking, I finally made up my mind that I was going to master this ancient skill of the Inuit people. Learning to roll was one of the greatest triumphs of my life. I wanted to share it. I knew that if I could convey even a small part of how it really feels to roll a kayak, I would be giving people a unique and powerful experience.

Up until recently, documentarians would have needed serious camera equipment. “Marie and I did all the shooting for *The Way of the Kayak* using six rented GoPro cameras fastened to two boats,” Richard said. “The GoPro is so advanced, it practically runs itself. Then there’s the iPhone. When the late Malik Bendjelloul ran out of money for his Oscar-winning documentary *Searching for*

Sugar Man, he finished shooting with an iPhone. And it worked!”

Richard and his wife, Marie, are still in the midst of the process. “What we completed is a five-minute trailer, which we posted on YouTube to promote the film. We tried to make the trailer a complete film unto itself, and it must have worked because most people don’t even notice that it’s a trailer.” Check it out and be inspired to grab a GoPro and get to work on your own documentary. Richard’s best piece of advice is this: “Pick a topic that you’re truly passionate about. Your passion will drive the film.”

been in juvenile detention four times, hospitalized three times. After all those years, all those specialists, and an alphabet soup of incorrect diagnoses, we had no idea how to help him. I wrote these words on my blog: “I am Adam Lanza’s mother.”

*The viral consequences of my essay were overwhelming. I was excoriated for talking openly about something that many critics said should be kept private: mental illness and violence. I quickly decided that advocacy trumps privacy, that I have nothing to be ashamed of, and that I will continue to speak up for my son and for the millions of families like mine who are still suffering in shame and silence. Since that day, I’ve testified to a congressional forum. I’ve spoken to numerous groups and given a TEDx talk about ending stigma. I wrote a book, *The Price of Silence: A Mom’s Perspective on Mental Illness*, which describes the many ways our broken system fails children, families, and communities. But it also offers hope.*

The best consequence of sharing my truth is that my son was finally diagnosed with bipolar disorder. Today, he is managing his condition, attending a mainstream school, and writing a book of his own. I’m still just a soccer mom in Boise, Idaho. But I’ve

learned that when soccer moms come together, they can change the world.

What is your cause? Education? Poverty? Art in the school? What would you like to change about the world, the country, your state, or your community? Raise your hand. Get involved. Start a movement and watch it grow.

Serve on a Grand Jury and Help Deliver Justice

Yes, we all cringe when the jury summons arrives in the mail. It's a natural reaction. But we know it is our civic duty so we respond. Truth be told, often it wasn't so bad, was it? In fact, being part of a grand jury can actually be fairly riveting. This can be a great way to experience our justice system and hopefully help people in the process.

Different from a regular jury, a grand jury is most often an investigative body whose purpose is to decide whether there should be a trial on the matter at hand.

In some counties, serving on a grand jury is through the jury summons system, so serving is not something you can actively seek out. In others, however, you can. You also don't have to have a background in law to serve on a grand jury. Communities that allow grand jury applicants are looking for people with a wide range of skills and backgrounds so they can achieve as balanced a perspective as possible. There's no point in having a grand jury made up of all attorneys or all accountants, for example.

Members serve terms ranging from six months to a year or more. Remember, the point is to delve deeply into a few matters and seriously examine an issue. "As a practical matter, it doesn't work if you have a full-time job," says Anthony Da Vito, a former grand jury member in California. "It is [sometimes] a year of your life. You need to keep a broad attitude about people and be able to engage in discourse. Serving on a grand jury will really give you an understanding about how government really works."

To find out if you can apply to be on a grand jury in your area, visit the website of your local courts system.

Help Create a National Park Larger than Yellowstone

Not that long ago, just a hundred and fifty years or so, the United States had huge areas of original prairie populated by thriving and diverse wildlife. A movement to re-create at least part of that is underway at the American Prairie Reserve in northeastern Montana. The goal is to acquire three million acres, a size that would rival the Serengeti in open space. Bison, antelope, bighorn sheep, prairie dogs, and other native species would roam freely. Another national park in the works, it seems.

Currently the project owns more than 275,000 acres of grasslands in the northern Great Plains. It is not easy to get there, requiring a drive of several hours by car from Billings, Montana, some of it on dirt roads. This is a project deep in development, not near its final stage.

You can help. By contributing, by volunteering for a month on a citizen scientist team, or by simply visiting to camp at Buffalo Camp, a rustic campground, or stay in one of the Kestrel Camp's swanky glamping (glamorous camping) tents, your efforts will help the organizers continue to acquire land and create more interest in the project. Help create a

park larger than Yellowstone? Not since the days of Teddy Roosevelt has the chance been available, The *National Geographic* calls it “one of the most ambitious conservation projects in American history.” So go and be a part of it.

I want to have fun being an athlete at the Olympics but balance that with the seriousness of going once again for a medal." Any nonathletic bucket list items for Stephanie? "Hunting in New Zealand with my husband."

The importance of volunteers is central to the Olympics experience, track-and-field gold medalist Stephanie Trafton points out. "Volunteers are part

Stephanie won gold in the women's discus-throwing event in Beijing. "Volunteers were everywhere," she said. "I never even had to reach out to open a door for myself. They were there to do it for me. It was something to see all of these people, so proud that their country was hosting the Olympics on the world stage."

Dig Up a Fossil

Harboring a Jurassic Park fantasy, are we? It may be easier than you think to become the bespectacled paleontologist with the battered and dusty wide-brimmed hat, focusing on fossilized bones. The Page Museum in downtown Los Angeles, more commonly known as the La Brea Tar Pits, uses volunteer help for much of what it does. Many thousands of years ago, saber-toothed tigers, woolly

mammoths, and various other prehistoric creatures wandered over to drink from what turned out to be a sticky tar pit. They got trapped, and now we're the scientific beneficiaries of their well-preserved skeletal remains.

To help out with the fossils, you need to be more than sixteen years old and able to commit at least one full day a week for a minimum of three months. What a great reason to rent a place on the beach for a few months and get to work helping to sort matrix (asphaltic and earthen material encasing the fossils). "Lab volunteers do the majority of the day-to-day preparation of fossils from our current excavations," according to the website. "The work they contribute is invaluable."

A few states over, Crow Canyon Archaeological Center lists opportunities for lifelong learners on their site, not only for their campus in southwest Colorado, but also for archaeologically themed scientific tours to places like Olmec and Mayan ruins in Mexico or archaeological sites in Crete.

Become a Theater Producer

You saw the Mel Brooks movie and took in the play, watching the wily producers convince sweet little old ladies to put their money into a Broadway show. And while laughing at their antics, you secretly thought, *Hmmm, produce a Broadway show... That does sound like fun.*

In real life, do only big shots put up the money? Actually, no. According to a recent *New York Times* report, the Tony-winning show *The Gentlemen's Guide to Love and Murder* had 130 investors who put up between \$25,000 and \$850,000 each for a total of 7.5 million.

Of course you shouldn't bet the farm. In fact, you will need to meet certain net-worth requirements for risky investments. But if you can afford the chance of losing your money, the fun and satisfaction might just be worth it to you. Think about opening-night tickets, maybe a party or two...and if the show wins a Tony, you all get to crowd onto the stage!

How would you get started on the path to becoming a producer? Try starting small on the local level. Many plays are developed in smaller markets first before heading to Broadway. For example, the LBJ play *All The Way* came not from the

New York theater scene but from Ashland, Oregon's Shakespeare Festival.

You can keep up on Broadway news through the Broadway League trade association or Broadway.org, which announces previews. If you attend a preview and fall in love with the play and its prospects, you could always raise your hand and see if they still need money. A production can take in more investors up until opening night.

Participate in Audubon's Annual Bird Count

The Audubon Society has organized nationwide bird counts in which thousands of bird lovers participate year after year. In the winter the society holds the Christmas Bird Count from December 14 to January 5. For Valentine's Day there is a Backyard Bird Count, and in the summer you can participate in hummingbird counts.

Why should you participate? Because citizen science matters, and if birds and nature are your thing,

you should help with this important effort. You don't need special skills—just your ability to look out the window and count what you see. Sometimes the counts take place out in the field; sometimes you can do it from your living-room window by drawing an imaginary circle and noting the birds that land or fly through it.

For more than one hundred years, Audubon has been holding the Christmas Bird Count. It is acknowledged to be the largest and longest-running citizen science effort in the world. Shouldn't you be doing it too?

"I figured who better to represent the student population." He'd heard about the new board on the radio and sent the governor an email describing how he could add to the discussion.

you could declare your candidacy, make a few signs, attend a few meetings, and mount a successful run for a statewide office, but many local offices still depend on the active participation of ordinary townsfolk. These may include school boards, city councils, fire districts, water boards, and other branches of local government.

Ellen Brazil Hasness worked in Washington, DC, for years and had a bird's-eye view of national politics and politicians. After retirement, she and her husband spent several years sailing around the Caribbean before reestablishing them-

selves in a small town in her native state. And it wasn't long before she felt the urge to get involved in local politics. "I figure if I can sail the ocean blue, I can do this," she said. Ellen won her race and now can pursue her bucket list goal to "take our little town into the future."

So, does your town—big or little—need you to do to help it into the future? Think about it... And who knows? You might start small and local and then feel the need to move up into another office in which you could have an even larger impact.

Start a Humanitarian Movement

She turned her attention to creating a group called Children as Teachers of Peace and gathered groups of young children to tour the world, calling on world leaders and delivering messages of hope and cooperation. They unfurled a handmade peace banner on

the Great Wall of China, met with the leader of the Soviet Union, and had an audience with the Pope. Did she have a background in creating nonprofits and organizing? No. She simply had a passion and the means to pursue it.

We are all global citizens, and the answers to the world's problems may lie more with ordinary folks rising up and trying to make change than with our leaders. Is there a world problem you feel passionate about?

Grandmothers for Peace was founded in 1981 by a grandmother, Barbara Wiedner, who grew alarmed at the proliferation of nuclear weapons. She believed that "the world is safer in grandmas' arms." Out of her own personal protest, she began to organize others and soon enough an organization was created.

Do you have humanitarian stirrings? No doubt many others share your views. You could start small with a discussion group in your home with like-minded people, or begin to encourage change through a letter-writing campaign.

Big movements grow from small beginnings. They always have. Start small and watch your humanitarian movement grow.

Participate in Cutting-Edge Scientific Research

Science and medicine are advanced through experimentation. And experiments need subjects, most often volunteers. Is it time for you to raise your hand and become a research participant? Rather than waiting until a medical condition arises and then requesting an experimental drug, you could be helping now by being the healthy participant. Volunteers are an integral part of the research process, and without a steady stream of volunteers, studies wouldn't be possible.

“My two young sons were involved in a scientific study at a local research university to try to find the cause of autism,” says Beanie Bern. “They needed nonautistic boys to study, and I loved the idea that they could help. And they felt very important too. Years from now I hope they can claim to have played a small role in discovering more about autism.”

Get Ready to Be a Hero

Sign up for a CPR class? Seriously? This seems so ordinary, somewhat mundane, and so very mature and sensible. How can this be a bucket list item? Because it should be. What greater honor and accomplishment is there than to save the life of another person?

For CPR a four-hour class is standard, and you can find one near you through the Red Cross website. You also can take free online courses at your own pace to understand the basic moves. The theory behind CPR has changed over the years and now focuses more on chest compressions and less on rescue breathing. The recommended pace to compress is to the beat of the Bee Gees' "Stayin' Alive."

If you're still not convinced the training is worth it, consider this: learning CPR and other lifesaving techniques is downright practical. Automated external

defibrillator (AED) paddles now hang in some office buildings and airports, but would you know how to use them in an emergency? Learning to properly operate AEDs is another skill available through the Red Cross.

In an emergency, you don't want to be standing around uncertain of what to do. You need to acquire the skills and gain the confidence to respond. You might save your partner's life, your grandchild's, a neighbor's, or a total stranger's. And you will know what to do.

Ride in a Vintage Bike Race in Tuscany

Yes, one of those organized bike rides through a beautiful part of the countryside has long been a dream of yours, hasn't it? Ride a little, eat a little, drink a little, sleep in a charming and rustic inn, that sort of thing. In France, maybe. Or Italy.

That's nice, but why not take it a step further and make it really unique? First, imagine biking in a group on white gravel roads through Tuscany. Now imagine that everyone around you, as far as the eye could see, is dressed in vintage cycling clothes and riding on classic bicycles. Now *that* would be cool. And it is real: it's a large race called the Eroica. Held every year on the first Sunday of October (a lovely time to cycle through the countryside anywhere!) in the Italian town of Gaiole, it is styled after a bygone era. This is not a bike race filled with spandex and high-tech cycling. These riders take the throwback idea seriously and are often dressed in old-time clothes and riding astride single-gear bikes from decades ago.

A local man started the race because he wanted to help preserve the famed white gravel roads in his region. The race started with fewer than a hundred vintage riders and has grown to a crowd of several thousand.

Don't have a vintage bike and a suitable outfit you can ship over to Italy for the race? Not to worry. You can rent appropriate bikes, and there is a large open-air market where all manner of classic and vintage apparel is sold.

But maybe you'd prefer to skip the throngs of other bicyclists and do it yourself, riding along the gravel roads at a slower pace. The English travel company Discovery Travel offers a self-guided 108-mile trip through the same region. Their package includes a twenty-one-gear bike, which might help you navigate those "undulating hills" easier than the old single-speed cruiser would.

One of the most famous is the centuries-old 450-mile Camino de Santiago in Spain. Set aside a month for the basic trek and another six to seven days to savor

the beauty along the way. Wearing good boots and carrying the basics—clothing, rain gear, and water—you'll journey through rustic villages, across dusty plains, and through challenging mountain passes with companions from around the world.

Anne Basye and her former college roommate Janet Murray walked a few years back. Anne describes it this way:

For thirty days your rhythm will be predictable. After a café con leche and a roll, you'll walk a few miles with fellow pilgrims and share a picnic lunch by the side of the road. Some miles later (ten to twelve a day, typically), you'll check into your hostel or albergue by 4:00 p.m., shower and rinse out your socks, change your clothes, and tuck into an early ten-pilgrim dinner replete with a bottle of local wine. By eight thirty or nine you'll be on your bunk bed in a dorm filled with dozens more pilgrims gathering strength to do the same thing again tomorrow.

Just like life, Anne says the journey will “mix the unforgettable (meals, sunsets, vistas, conversations) with the mundane and the painful (blisters, sunburns, rain showers, bug bites). And when you reach

Santiago—one of the world's most beautiful cities, by the way—you'll be so enamored of life on the road that you'll want to keep going." Visit the informative American Pilgrims website hosted by North Americans who have walked the way.

In North America, a pilgrim path is growing and developing at El Santuario de Chimayo in New Mexico, and grants are in the works to develop a similar pilgrim path among the California missions.

A bushcraft area focuses on wilderness survival tips and primitive technology you can build and use on the road, should you need it.

Take the Land Rover overland driving course to hone your skills, using your own vehicle or the test vehicle. The Expo also offers motorcycle skills courses staffed by BMW and activities at the Adventure Motorcycle Rodeo Arena.

Cross the Seas in an Ocean Liner

The idea of ship travel holds great allure and romance, but being aboard an enormous floating suburban mall of a cruise ship doesn't appeal to everyone. The idea of an ocean crossing in a large ship with just a handful of other passengers retains much of the glamour of yesteryear.

My parents, George and Mary Alice Basye, sailed the West Coast in 1981 on an American President Lines container ship headed with a load to Egypt, which they were hoping to see for a little while before the ship returned to the United States. Alas, just as they arrived, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat was assassinated and the country was in turmoil. Rather than wait for another load, the ship turned around and came back empty, making for one bumpy ride across the Atlantic, which wasn't part of my parents' plan! But they had to do it or risk being stranded there. Traveling on freighters, you must always remember that these are working ships, not passenger ships, and that their priority is to haul freight.

Traveling onboard a working freighter is an opportunity only for the very seasoned traveler. Rather than having the posh and glamorous layout of a cruise ship, a working freighter has only a few staterooms and so only a few passengers. Ships carrying more than a certain number of passengers are required to have a doctor onboard, and freighters do not. However, you will dine often with the captain and sometimes the radio man.

If this doesn't intimidate you, check the Freighter Cruises website for where the ships go and how much the voyages cost. Far less than a cruise, of course, but remember you are on a working ship whose sole

focus is getting their cargo to port on time. You will have done something that few other folks have the nerve to do though. How does this sound for a route: Houston to New Orleans to the Bahamas to Portugal to Spain to several ports in Italy before heading back to Spain, Portugal, and the Bahamas, adding Florida and two ports of call in Mexico before heading back to Houston. Every seven weeks that is the route of the *Buxcliff*. Pack a suitcase full of books to read, and settle in for the long haul.

Old Roads, New Experiences

The United States has several well-known and well-traveled original highways. In the West you'll find Route 66, Highway 40, and Highway 1. Back East, some people get dreamy looks thinking of driving U.S. 1, the elevated road that links the Florida Keys. You can drive from island to island, from Key Largo to Key West, all the time marveling at the amount

of construction and engineering that was involved in building the road.

The Pacific Coast Highway in California stretches the length of the state through different types of regions and communities—from the laid-back surf towns like Dana Point all the way up to the thickly forested areas around Eureka. Which old road do you dream of driving?

Peter Sander, an Ohio native and longtime road tripper, filled us in on some of the choices.

The most famous route of all is the heralded Route 66 from Chicago to Los Angeles, also known as “Main Street of America” or the “Will Rogers Highway”—but this route has largely been superseded by interstates and formally ceased to exist in 1985. A few chunks of the old road remain in parallel to Interstate 40 in Arizona, but for the most part this road and its tantalizing historic travel infrastructure are gone.

Instead of Route 66, try one of the country’s many long stretches of lonely road, some literally in the middle of nowhere, some running more or less parallel to existing interstates. All provide a great glimpse into the travel experience of the past and are

a fun ride. U.S. 50 still runs across the country from Sacramento, California, to Ocean City, Maryland. The most interesting stretch—between Carson City, Nevada and Salina, Utah—is aptly named “The Loneliest Road in America.” It passes through stunning Great Basin desertscapes and old mining camps with intriguing names like Eureka, Nevada. Also not to be missed is America’s newest and least visited national park, Great Basin National Park, outside Ely, Nevada.

A fun ride can also be had on U.S. 6, the “Grand Army of the Republic Highway,” which starts out in Bishop, California, east of the Sierra Nevada range, heads east through another more southerly chunk of the Nevada desert and Soldier Summit in Utah, runs parallel to several interstate highways but in many places takes a route of its own, finally ending up (or starting out, depending on which way you’re going) on the tip of Cape Cod. Along the way are many scenic and cultural tastes of a past-tense America, including the communal Amish-like Amana Colonies in east central Iowa.

Interesting rides can also be found on desolate U.S. 2, running from Michigan’s Upper Peninsula west to Everett, Washington, largely just south of the United

States and Canada's border. Not surprisingly, it's been called "America's Air-Conditioned Highway" and passes through remote outposts like Havre (that's pronounced Have-er), Montana, and the Teddy Roosevelt National Park in northern North Dakota. U.S. 30 parallels the original Union Pacific Railroad alignment through central Nebraska—plenty of grain elevators and A&W root beer stands along this one—and 135 trains a day run along the busy mainline just to add a bit of interest.

If you're headed north or south, there's always U.S. 41 of Allman Brothers "Ramblin' Man" fame, and U.S. 287 from Canada to Mexico along the eastern slopes of the Rockies. Anywhere you go, you'll get a different travel experience, laced with images of the past and largely devoid of the big trucks and gotta-get-there drivers found on most of today's major highways.

Hike the Trails of the World, from California to the Alps

The book *Wild* spawned a thousand solo women backpackers on the Pacific Crest Trail, which is one long and dusty road. Not all of us are cut out to hoist on a heavy pack and spend weeks or months on the trail's segments from Mexico to Canada. What can the rest of us do? How about shorter hikes from hut to hut? Hut-to-hut hiking could be the way to go.

Longtime friends Laura Lynne Powell and Jasmin Hakes didn't have time for the entire Pacific Crest Trail, so they focused on a part where they could start out from a rustic lodge and hike back at the end of the day, knowing that a glass of wine awaited them. "We started hiking at dawn right outside our door," Laura Lynne said, "and felt transformed by every step and every second as the sun rose on the horizon, changing the landscape around us. It was a natural high!"

In Colorado, an entire system of huts was developed during World War II for troop-training purposes. When the war ended, the 10th Mountain Division huts became civilian hiking destinations. There are thirty-four back-country huts altogether, some easier to get to than others.

While Colorado has thirty-four, the Alps have some three thousand huts scattered through several countries.

Another hiking trail to dip in and out of is the Appalachian Trail, one of the world's longest continuously marked trails. It's more than 2,000 miles long, wandering through fourteen states, and visited by several million people a year. Not all at once, thankfully. Although some sturdy souls set out to hike the entire length, far more choose smaller sections to suit their own schedule. The Appalachian Trail Conservancy site is filled with information on which parts of the trail are easy and which parts

are strenuous, as well as what times of the year are best to catch the fall colors along the way.

Don't feel that you're not a real hiker unless you're hauling a pack and spending months on the dirt trail. Get out there and do as much or as little as suits you. It's all good.

Finally going on a long-awaited journey or to a long-anticipated event? Why not prolong the experience by walking there? A few years back an enterprising young man decided that he would walk to the World Cup—through all of South America! That might be considered a tad extreme, but what a great way to steep yourself in an experience that otherwise might pass by quickly!

Perhaps you could walk the same route you drive every day, just to see what the experience is like on the ground. Literally. It might open your eyes to seeing your community in a whole new light.

You've seen pictures of the elegant, narrow boats navigating a French canal, and you can envision yourself onboard, wineglass in hand, as the scenery floats by. What are you waiting for? The company LeBoat will not only rent you a lovely little boat but actually teach you what you need to know to operate the boat yourself and then send you on your way. They operate in several countries, in case you have a wide array of fantasies to fulfill. The Canal du Midi in the South of France? Down the Thames in England? Motor toward Trieste? Float past medieval timber houses in Germany? Yes, all of those are possible.

Though be forewarned: you probably want to have some basic boating experience or get a couple lessons before you go. While LeBoat offers basic tutorials,

they may not be sufficient for longer or more complicated excursions or itineraries. Publishing executive Stephanie Bowen and her family almost found themselves in over their heads (thankfully not literally!) when they rented a canal boat from LeBoat for two weeks without prior experience sailing or driving a boat. But they quickly caught on, and she said it was truly the experience of a lifetime (and she even learned a new skill while she was at it).

In Northern France you will find Catherine Saint-James and her charming two-boat company Ille Flottante. You can float through Brittany in brand-new custom boats that look like small gypsy caravans and sleep two. The website is in French, but just send her an email and she can respond in English.

What about living on a houseboat in Paris? You know you want to. The *Viking* is tied up on the Seine near the Bois de Boulogne, about ten minutes from the center of town. The boat is usually rented out for long stretches and therefore unavailable, but it's well worth checking to see if it is available.

Up the road from there in Santa Monica you can swim in the pool built for William Randolph Hearst's longtime mistress Marion Davies for far less than donating enough to swim at Hearst Castle. Davies's former beachside pool opened to the public a few years back, so lounging beside it is perfectly affordable.

Swimming farther afield will take you to cliff-side pools on the Mediterranean like the 1920s Le Corbusier-designed Punta Tragara in Capri or the Hôtel du Cap-Eden-Roc in Cannes.

Hungary and Germany also have a famous pool or two. "It looks like you are walking into the 1930s," says Roxanne Langer of the famous pool at the Hotel Gellért in Budapest. "You feel like a movie star. And if you want to look like a movie star after all the Hungarian pastries you will need to jump in and start swimming laps!" In Berlin the Badeschiff is a floating river barge with a pool that is open to the elements in the summer and under a big protective bubble the

rest of the year. Intrigued? Let the waters be your guide as you plan one long swim into the future...

Although we usually imagine colonial India when we think of Rudyard Kipling, he actually spent time living in Vermont. Naulakha, the large house he lived in near Brattleboro, is now owned by the Landmark Trust USA and is available to rent for \$390–\$450 a night. To sit at Kipling's desk and gaze out a window that he once looked out... How much closer can you get to being in the story?

Prolific romance and mystery author Nora Roberts owns the Inn BoonsBoro in Boonsboro, Maryland, where the rooms are named after famous romantic pairings, like Rhett and Scarlett. And fans of James Bond creator Ian Fleming can rent his house in Jamaica, where he would bang out each Bond book over the course of a winter. You can rent one room, but bring your friends because it is a five-bedroom house. That way you can split the cost. (The low-season rate for five bedrooms is \$5,500 a night.) Hemingway fans can't spend the night in his Key West residence, but you can get married or have a special event there.

What about spending the night inside a bookstore? In Paris the famed bookstore Shakespeare and Company (not the original one owned by Sylvia Beach, but one that she gave her blessing to) has always had a policy of allowing up to four writers, so-called “tumbleweeds,” to spend the night. Some stay for weeks.

Castles are largely a European idea. Here in the United States they are simply called mansions, and few are of comparable age to those routinely found in Europe. Westenhanger Castle in Kent, England, was recently on the market for 2.6 million pounds, or about \$3.9 million, not too bad considering it has been fully restored from when Henry VIII used it as a place to meet his mistresses. It is also a

popular wedding rental venue, so the price included the possible income stream to help the next owner keep up appearances.

A thirty-room French castle in Aix-en-Provence dating from the thirteenth century was listed at \$18 million and comes with its own vineyard producing between 150,000 and 200,000 bottles of wine every year. For the really big wallet, Dracula's castle in Romania, known as Bran Castle, is on the market for

\$140 million. Built in 1212 and fully restored in the late 1980s, the castle is visited by thousands of paying visitors every year.

If you only have access to somewhat smaller sums, the Castles for Sale website allows hopeful purchasers to list the kind of castle they are seeking. “Looking for a castle in England, Ireland, or Scotland...that can be used as a bed and breakfast,” says a gentleman from California. “Willing to consider a fixer-upper” in Austria, says another hopeful future castle owner.

Embark on an African Safari by Foot

Ever read an article about those brave scientists who go out into the bush to study animals in their natural habitat? The kind of hardy soul who’s willing to go again and again to sit quietly near a wild herd until the group grows comfortable. Susan Carson thought that sounded like a challenge and arranged to visit gorillas in their natural environment.

By searching around online I found walkingsafari.com. Now I had been on safari in a Land Rover,

which was safe but not very exciting. A walking safari sounded great. My friend and I were sixty-five at the time though, so we thought we should meet the person who'd help us make the arrangements, Robert Brierly, based in Switzerland with his wife and family. He was surprised we were willing to travel so far to organize the trip. No one had ever done that. But our safety was in his hands. He and his family were lovely.

We stayed in Langenthal a few days, visited and planned the trip in detail: what we wanted to see and do, what kind of accommodations we wanted, and how long we were willing to stay. I even asked about visiting a synagogue in eastern Uganda. But what I really wanted to do was hike into the jungle to see the mountain gorillas. I had heard about the adventure, and we were both up for the experience. A real motivator for getting in shape. We picked the dates, based on the best season for travel, and left the rest up to Robert.

And how was it? Susan was thrilled.

It was an amazing experience. More than I expected. We were met at Entebbe by Robert, spent the night at a home and office he owns in Kampala, and took

off the following morning. We had a vehicle with a driver for the entire three weeks, and our itinerary was set per our requests. We spent two days doing smaller hikes to see other animals near the Bwindi Impenetrable Forest, where the gorillas were living. That built up the suspense and adventure. But the climax was the day of the big adventure.

Thunder and lightning the night before had me secretly hoping the hike would be canceled. But off we went to meet the Uganda Wildlife Authority, early in the morning. Six people at a time were allowed to go. We were told the rules, no nonsense, and given the option of hiring a porter to help us maneuver the muddy jungle terrain. Five hours of difficult hiking later, under very hot conditions, we were rewarded with a thirty-minute visit with a family of mountain gorillas, silverback and all. What a thrill!

Unfortunately, Susan's guide has passed away, but his wife is carrying on with his company, Nkuringo Safaris. "Regina Brierly will provide the experience of a lifetime," Susan promises.

Jump in with the Big Boys

The idea of swimming with dolphins is on many a bucket list, but what about raising the stakes and swimming with sharks? Yes, it does sound dangerous, but before you go running for safety, consider this: what if they were really big, really slow, really kind sharks that are almost as gentle and friendly toward humans as dolphins? These kinds of sharks do exist: whale sharks. And as the largest living nonmammalian vertebrate, they do not pose a significant danger to humans.

So how can you capture this once-in-a-lifetime experience? Every summer on the Isla Mujeres, off the coast of Cancun, Mexico, whale sharks congregate. And every summer more than a few hearty souls put on fins and snorkels and swim alongside. Scary? Not really, it seems. Steve Broin, the owner of a small hotel there, describes it this way: “The whale

sharks are not afraid of us rather diminutive creatures swimming beside them. At times they seem almost humored by our presence.”

If the thought of being surrounded by gobs of spring breakers scares you even more than the sharks, don't worry. The Isla Mujeres, the island of women, is not at all like its flashy neighbor, resort and bar-laden Cancun. It's much quieter and calmer. Steve's hotel, Casa Sirena, a small bed-and-breakfast, is the best place to stay. Steve can help you arrange a shark-swimming trip with a licensed captain who has an English-speaking crew member. You can find more information on whale shark tours at the Ceviche Tours website. The season generally runs from the middle of May through the middle of September.

Travel with Your Favorite Baseball Team

Devoted to your hometown team? Catch a home game at the local stadium as often as possible? What about taking it up a notch and traveling with the team? Okay, maybe not on the same bus, but perhaps staying in the same hotel. Debbie Ammerman tells us how.

I love to visit U.S. cities, and Rex loves baseball... so we are aiming to see the SF Giants play in as many different cities as we can. It's a lot more than just going to the game. It's the experience of visiting another baseball park, the people, and their city.

It's easy to sit in AT&T Park where you are with 42,000 people wearing the same jersey, but when you meet your team's fans in another city you are coconspirators. It's fun walking into another team's stadium and showing your colors. There is a camaraderie that takes place with your fellow fans. It starts when you board your plane. Then you run into them in bars, you see them on subways, you see them on the street. There is a kinship. You make eye contact, you immediately bond.

We went to New York to see the SF Giants play first the Yankees and then the Mets, two teams and two stadiums in one city. I boarded my subway

train, and virtually everyone in that compartment had a Giants uniform on. It's so much fun. There is a San Francisco sports bar in New York City called Finnerty's, and when you walk in, it's like being in a bar in San Francisco with Giants fans.

Lots of fans stay at the same hotel as the team. It's cool because you are staying with the team while attending the game. In San Diego we stayed at the Omni, and the players, broadcasters, and their families were there with us. You run into the players getting coffee, eating dinner, or riding the elevator. No one makes a big deal of it. Fans respect the players' privacy, and it makes the experience so enjoyable.

Is that it? Are Rex and Debbie done with their baseball journeys? Of course not. "Next is Wrigley Field to see the iconic Chicago Cubs and their stadium. Can't wait to check out the city and support our team!"

An even bigger bucket-list goal is to visit as many of the major league ballparks around the country as possible—or perhaps all. That is what television reporter Mike Luery did with his son, Matt. Not in one summer though. It took sixteen years to hit every park on the list. Mike wrote about the experience in his book *Baseball Between Us*.

Baseball is a game of numbers. Batting averages, runs batted in, and winning percentages are the currency of America's national pastime. But there is also great value in being in the ballpark, especially with someone you love. When my son, Matt, was just five, I discovered that he savored the smell of Cracker Jack and the taste of a hot dog smothered in mustard as much as I do. I knew we had to hit the road for the ultimate baseball experience.

Together, we traveled 43,000 miles over sixteen years to attend baseball games in thirty-two different venues, from Fenway Park in Boston to Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles. It was the ultimate father-son bonding experience born from a bucket list to visit every major league park in North America.

Traveling by train, plane, and automobile we fought over food, music, and bedtime, but by the time the journey ended, Matt was twenty-one—and we could celebrate our accomplishment by drinking beers together at the ballpark. For me, it was the ultimate parenting experience, and I know my son loved it too because he told me, “Dad, we will always have baseball between us.”

Hôtel de Glace, the first North American ice hotel. In Finland you can stay in a castle made from ice, Snow Castle, in Kemi. For twenty years the castle has been built on the Gulf of Bothnia, and it includes a public restaurant in case you don't want to spend the whole night in an icy room.

You can also try building an icehouse of your own. The Urban Gardens website has a charming story about some New Zealanders who built their own backyard igloo out of colorful ice blocks made from hundreds of empty milk cartons. This could be a project that will keep you busy all winter long!

Up, Up, and Away! Ride in an Old-Fashioned Airplane

Another day, another plane ride. Air travel is so hum-drum nowadays, not in the least bit exciting or sexy. But what if you could ride in a glider? A seaplane? An open-cockpit aircraft? Stephanie Taylor leads a life filled with excitement of the art variety—installing large sculptures and murals that she designs—but she'd longed to ride in an old-fashioned airplane. And so she did.

The pilot turns a sleek wooden propeller by hand, as if the plane is going to fly by a tensioned rubber band. The single engine of the 1943 Stearman catches with a throaty roar. Like aviation pioneers, I'd always

wanted to fly in such a tiny, vulnerable craft, mere canvas stretched over wooden frame, one bright yellow wing over the other, cockpit open to the wind, the sound, the sun.

Flying over rice fields, we bank hard. Wings dip and down we go, low, very low, leveling off just feet from the ground. Each little green blade of new growth sticks up through shallow water, almost tickling the bottom of the plane. Pulling hard on the stick, we reach for the sky. And down we go, diving. In the banked turn, gravity has no pull, no g-force, just steeply angled to 45 degrees, looking straight to earth, graceful and eerily silent within my leather helmet.

Outside the protection of the windshield, my hand hits a hurricane-force 100 mph slipstream that could rip my watch right off my wrist. I look down at the stick between my legs that looks most like a baseball bat and at my feet resting on the metal floor, safely away from the brakes. "Don't put your feet on those pedals," the pilot warns. "Whatever you do, don't touch them." The implications are obvious.

Would she do it again? "Yes, I'd do it again. The pilot asked if I wanted to take the controls, and I would have but didn't want to miss all the sensations

at that moment. So perhaps if I do it again, I'd accept that challenge."

Setting goals and doing anything creative can feel like a lonely individual process, but it doesn't have to be. Any kind of goal or dream can be achieved more quickly if you are out in the open about it. Everyone in your life wants to see you succeed and be happy, so let them help you.

Travel goals are the same, a chance to let others in on what you are longing to do. Tell everyone what you have in mind, and you might begin to hear things like this:

“Paris? My cousin has an apartment there. I'll ask if you can use it.”

“An ice hotel? I’ve always wanted to go to one. Let’s share a room!”

“A pilgrimage down Route 66? Let’s take my old Ford Mustang!”

Suddenly what started as a dream seems a lot more realistic.

2. Write Down Your Goals

Goal setting is not something that came naturally to me. After bumping into Mark Victor Hansen, the coauthor of the *Chicken Soup for the Soul* inspirational book series on many occasions and listening to his motivational speeches, I finally sat down and did as he said. I wrote out 101 goals in purple ink.

“Purple is the highest color,” he had said before repeating one of his mantras. “Don’t just think it, ink it!” Fifteen years later, I have achieved a healthy number of those original 101 goals, some of which were quite lofty (Raise Wise Sons) and some of which were pretty selfish (Wear More Cashmere). I still need to Brush Up My Latin, but hey, you have to keep something out there to reach for.

Writing out your goals is a fun exercise, but to really get motivated, make it an event. Don’t just tap them into your iPad or phone. Sit down with some

nice stationery and a quality pen. Pour a little wine, or sit in a window with a beckoning view. Perhaps light a scented candle if you have one nearby.

Create some atmosphere, and then let your mind and imagination run wild. Write down crazy things too—you are just warming up and they don't have to be on your actual bucket list. Most of all, write as if money, time, space, physics, and time are no object. With the right mindset, when you set out to make these things happen, the ordinary obstacles just might fall away.

In closing, remember the three steps to insider status and the chance for a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity:

1. Volunteer—Volunteering at a museum you love or for a cause that animates you will bring you into contact with like-minded people who share your interests and might well have the knowledge or contacts or ideas to help you achieve your goals.
2. Join support groups—Simply by sending in the smallest amount to belong to a “friends of” organization, you will begin to receive the newsletter and be kept apprised of the activities and opportunities

that others will not know about. Behind-the-scenes tours, special events inside a building you long to know better, or the chance to travel with others who share your interest will all come your way for a modest investment.

3. Charity auction items—A trip to fashion week in Paris? An exotic dinner party inside a zoo? The chance to fly in a vintage plane? The chance to have your name used as a character in a book by one of your favorite authors? These kinds of unusual opportunities are routinely made available at charity auctions. Attend these events on a regular basis and you will have the chance to lead a far more interesting life, should you have the wallet and bank account to back it up.

So, which of the things in this book are on my own personal bucket list? Well, here are a few goals I have set for myself in the coming years:

*Commission an opera from a major composer,
based on a well-known literary work, to be
performed by a major opera company.*

Visit the Jim Thompson House in Bangkok and dine on the patio.

Perfect the recipe for boeuf bourguignon (the real one, not the Julia Child shortcut!).

Write a book on Paris while living in Paris and give an author talk at Shakespeare and Company.

Learn more Latin.

Attend a function at the White House.

Explore Yellowstone National Park through all five different entrances (only two left to go!).
